Read Romans 11:22. How do you see Paul's message being played out here with the rich man (Pharisees, Scribes) and poor Lazarus (tax collectors, sinners, gentiles)?

Do you see the picture of Luke 13:28-35 and 14:24 being played out in the meta-story of Luke 16:19-31? What eternal consequences lie at the end of the difficult choice of paying the price of discipleship or the price of not being a disciple?
